

Prior Learning

This unit will build on the knowledge and skills learned in KS1

Prior learning will be knowledge of other civilisations in the past, the understanding of a timeline and dates, the use of artefacts and online sources to find out about the past and the use of questioning such as: What was it like for people? What happened? How long ago? Children will also be building on the knowledge gained in previous history units: Romans in Britain and Vikings and Anglo Saxons.
