Learning Sequence	
Monet's Garden	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Use bright colours to paint a garden in the style of Claude Monet. • Use fingers to apply thick paint.
Monet's Cityscapes	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Use pastels to create a colourful sky. • Create a reflection of a building, as if in water • Learn how colour can be used to capture changing light
Van Gogh Landscapes	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Use bright colours in the painting of a landscape, in the style of Van Gogh. • Use thick paint to create visible brushstrokes, in the style of Van Gogh.

	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Paint with small round, or straight, lines.
Van Gogh's Starry Night	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Use blue and yellow to paint the sky, the moon and stars, mirroring how Van Gogh painted pictures at different times of day. • Study the different brushstrokes that Van Gogh used and use thick paint to create visible brushstrokes, including swirls.
Metzinger's Colourful Landscapes	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Compare and contrast the different painting styles of Metzinger and Van Gogh. • Sketch the key features of a landscape. • Colour squares in different colours to create features of a landscape. • Make a landscape bright and colourful in the style of Metzinger.
Metzinger Mosaics	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Compare and contrast the work of Monet, Van Gogh and Metzinger • Use bright coloured paper to create a mosaic landscape in the style of Metzinger. • Learn how to leave small gaps in between the squares to mimic a mosaic.
